Shapiro presenting the 2023-2024 state budget proposal to the general assembly soon; he has not yet indicated what levels of funding or initiatives will be included; interesting to see how the recent school funding case, which Panther Valley School District was a part of, will have any influence over his education proposals • Reported in October 2022 that our electricity agreement expires in June of 2023; were planning on locking in a new contract in November, but the market was volatile, so we postponed our timeline.
